Special IAVE Recognitions

Next, I'd like to make a couple of very special awards. From time to time the Board of IAVE awards a Life Membership to a person who in our view has made a substantial contribution to volunteering throughout the world and through their work with IAVE.

Today I am pleased to present two such awards:

The first is to a woman who began her relationship with IAVE in 1972 when she participated in the second World Conference held in Manila, Philippines as a representative of the Korean Girl Scouts.

However her entire career has been based on volunteer work and her commitment to volunteering began when she started Girl Scouting in Korea during the Korean War.

She subsequently served as the President of the World Federation of Methodist Women and as a board member of IAVE. In 1986 she started the Kakdang Welfare Foundation to spread volunteerism in Korea by training volunteers and placing them to work at various organisations including the Korean Association for Volunteer Effort that focuses on care for troubled young people, the Korean Association for Death Education and Counselling (KADEC) which trains leaders to support people to prepare for death and the Korean Association for Rainbow Hospice (KARH) which regularly conducts hospice volunteer training and a home hospice program – something that was the first of its kind in Korea.

I would like to acknowledge Dr Oknah Lah, now aged 98 for her role in promoting, supporting and celebrating volunteering and invite her son Mr Jake Lah to accept the Award on her behalf.

Our second recipient of an IAVE Life Membership Award is someone who has also made a very significant contribution to volunteering and IAVE over a very long period of time.

It also highlights how strong volunteering is in Korea as our next award recipient is also from that country.

Dr Kanghyun Lee, introduced the modern concept of volunteer management in Korea and founded the first volunteer centre, Federation of Volunteer Efforts in Busan, Korea.

He was instrumental in passing the Volunteering Act of 2005 and co-chaired the Board of the Korea Council of Volunteering, an umbrella organisation recognised by that Act for providing leadership in the field of volunteering in Korea.

He has taught on volunteerism and volunteer management at several universities.

Dr Lee served as the Secretary General of the IYV2001 Korea Commission and represented the Asia-Pacific Region on the board of IAVE and in 2002 he led Korea's efforts to host the 2002 17th IAVE World Volunteer Conference, before serving as IAVE World President from 2008 to 2014.

Please join me in welcoming Dr Lee to the stage to accept this Life Membership Award.
